Grandpa Charlie attempted to teach Jeremiah and Josh how to fish with their new fishing poles. We are very grateful to be together as a family and that Bob has come home safely from his numerous adventures. Bob's year would sound like a monologue of a travel agent if we listed all of them. So we will only tell of a few In September, just after the Olympics, Bob went to Madrid, Spain. He taught a short course there in neural networks. It is exciting to see when plans really do happen as this conference seemed very iffy at times. Bob flew into Rostov-on-Don in Russia with two other Americans who were attending the conference. The Don river is said to separate Europe from Asia. Dr. Witali Dunin-Barkowski of the Neurocybernetics Research Institute, Rostov State University, Russia, served as the conference's General Chair. Bob was the International Chair.

The highlight of Bob's trip was dinner in a Moscow apartment of a Russian family. The apartment was in one of the countless high rises built around Moscow. Anatoly, the father, is a computer programmer who is working for a new private company specializing in optical pattern recognition. Natasha, the wife (and aunt of Witali Dunin-Barkowski) is working to establish a Christian school in Moscow. She asked us to mail some fund raising material for her in the States. The teenage son had been practicing his English, and conversed with the Americans pretty well. There is currently a greater freedom of religion in Russia than the United States. Actions, for example, have been levied against the University of Washington's chapter of Campus Crusade for Christ because the organization does not conform to some modern concepts of political correctness. Christianity and other religions, on the other hand, are discussed openly and embraced in Russian education and government institutions. Natasha's attempt to open a private Christian school in Moscow was impressive. She and Anatoly had been secret Christians throughout the rule of intolerant atheistic communism. Anatoly told Bob in broken English that `Russia has lived to long without Christ.'

Bob was amazed at the inflation of the ruble. He was able to buy a fantastic breakfast for three people for \$0.35. He liked the Russian people but he could definitely see the damaging effects of a communist government. The

people had very little real concept of what a democracy is all about. The food was extremely greasy and in short supply for the Russian people. The buildings were very run down and everything looked very gray.

Bob and I flew to Beijing, CHINA on Nov. 1, 1992. This is the most awesome trip I have ever been on. I think about it almost every day. Bob was treated as a V.I.P. as he helped to organize their first International Joint Conference on Neural Networks in China. We were able to stay in a western hotel that was built for the Asian Games in 1990. They treated us to special Chinese banquets and a beautiful Chinese dance and music show. We ate unusual things such as jellyfish, turtle soup, Peking Duck, and 1,000 yr. old eggs. We were awed by seeing The Great Wall, The Forbidden City, Tinnamen Square, The Heavenly Palace and the silk markets. The millions of bicycles will forever be etched in our minds. It seemed like a wonderful idea on a sunny day for everyone to be riding bicycles, but when we saw them riding in a snowstorm and in the dark the reality of their lives began to be more clear. They carry everything on their bicycles including pigs, couches, coal, large bags of garbage and multiple numbers of people. We experienced riding in a rickshaw around Tinnamen Square and then fighting over the price of the ride as the peddler wanted to charge us a months wages for a 15 minute ride. Wherever I went, the Chinese people would be curious as I really stood out as a foreigner with my blond hair. Bob seemed to tower over most of the people.

Our trip was exceptional because our dream of meeting Xue Zhen and Ming's daughter Jing and son-in-law became a reality. We wanted to bring greetings and love from their parents who lived with us for 9 months and defected from China because of persecution. We were able to have meaningful conversations with Jing as she is a professor of English. We were surprised to find out what the Chinese are told of Americans. (most are all unemployed, starving, carry guns, are on drugs, and we are dying of air pollution) Jing found out that the Communist government really does lie about the United States. Their sharing with us was very precious to us. She told us that they live in a small two room compound with his family. They do have electricity and coal heat as of Nov. 1. However, they will never be able to save up enough to have a telephone and their community bathroom is non-flushing. She said she rides her bicycle 3 hours/day to get to work. Their cooking is all done outside in the community courtyard. Millions of cabbages are piled on the ground on the streets. She said that for very many years, cabbage is their only vegetable in winter. We did not see starvation like you see in Somalia, however, most Americans would not want to exist on their diet. Most meals consist of rice and cabbage. We did not see any Chinese people eating in nice restaurants. Both Jing and her husband are well educated and are professors, and they hope to work very hard and in 15 to 20 years, they hope the Chinese government will allow them to rent their own one room place. They felt they could not even afford to have one child. We were able to talk to them about God. She asked for my Bible. We continue to pray for them and the Chinese people and hope other believers will also. We were able to treat them to a wonderful dinner in the Beijing Hotel which is very grand, as it was built to host and impress President Nixon when he visited to open up China and help to end the terrible cultural revolution. The only people who were not in terrible poverty were the heads of the Communist Party who traveled around in Mercedes.

When we were asked to tell about our life style in the United States, we had to tone it way down as the truth to them would have seemed totally unbelievable.

Bob and I are learning a new appreciation for our democratic form of government, after Bob's trip to Russia and our trip to China. We were very disappointed at the outcome of our Presidential election. More than ever we can see how we need to keep our country vital with a free enterprise system and one who protects our religious freedom. We noticed that when the government provides the jobs, the government absolutely controls the people.

As I watched our children sing in the Christmas Program, I felt very grateful that we could celebrate and teach our children the real reason for the season JESUS! We wish you a very Merry CHRISTmas!

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
